

# Wayne-Holmes Soap Box Derby Local Race Rules/Guidelines and Special Instructions

## 54th Annual Race June 21 - 22, 2008



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### 2008 All-American Soap Box Derby Rules

Rules are drafted by the National Control Board and adopted by the Board of Trustees of the All-American Soap Box Derby. Specific questions regarding interpretation of these rules may be directed in writing to the National Control Board in care of the All-American Soap Box Derby. However, while the National Control Board may render an expert opinion to a given situation, the final decision making authority on a local level lies with those local officials named for that purpose. Accordingly, the rules interpretation rendered by the National Control Board shall in no event alter or limit the authority of the local officials. In each case those officials will endeavor to reach correct and fair decisions but they will not necessarily be bound by precedents or advanced opinions.

The two main purposes of the rules contained in this book are fairness to all competitors and safety. If the rules sometimes appear exceptionally restrictive, it is because experience has shown that too much room for interpretation sometimes results in a deviation from the intent of the rule. We believe that all competitors should have an equal chance based upon their own abilities.

It is important that the Derby car operates with maximum safety and that there are no car parts which would cause injury in the event of loss of control. Rules are designated to facilitate a smooth conduct of the race by avoiding unnecessary delays.

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The Board of Trustees of the Wayne-Holmes Soap Box Derby, the Derby Director and Assistant Derby Director of the Wayne-Holmes Soap Box Derby are the official governing body of the Wayne-Holmes Soap Box Derby. The rules established by the National Control Board and the All-American Soap Box Derby are the bases for all rules established for the Wayne-Holmes Soap Box Derby, but all final rules decisions and interpretations for the local race are under the authority of the local governing officials.

The following listing of rules have been established for the local race and included activities of the Wayne-Holmes Soap Box Derby.

#### 1. Age Limit Eligibility

- Any boy or girl who will be age 8 by June 21, 2008 and not 18 before July 26, 2008.
- Stock Div.: Participants must be age 8 by June 21, 2008 and must not turn age 14 before July 26, 2008.
- Super Stock Div.: Participants must be age 10 by June 21, 2008 and must not turn age 18 before July 26, 2008.
- Masters Div.: Participants must be age 10 by June 21, 2008 and must not turn age 18 before July 26, 2008.

#### 2. Used Cars

Every year there is a limited number of cars available from drivers who have raced in the past. If you purchase a used car, it must be disassembled down to its basic parts. A photo should be taken of the disassembled car along with its new driver or have it inspected by the derby director or a member of the board of trustees. This insures that the young driver will learn and gain from the experience of building their soap box derby car.

#### 3. Axles

All axles have to be All-American Soap Box Derby Axles. Nothing else can be used. You can either purchase them through the local derby or direct from the All-American in Akron. Derby axles must be stamped 2001 or after.

#### 4. Racing Format

The Wayne-Holmes Soap Box Derby is run as a "Double Elimination Timer/Wheel Swap". This means each driver will race their competitor in one lane, swap wheels with that competitor, then return to topside, switch lanes, and race the same car again. The difference in time determines the winner of the that heat. The winner continues on, in the winners bracket, and the loser goes to the consolation bracket. After a second loss the car and driver are eliminated from further competition. The winner of the losers bracket will go on to race the winner of the winners bracket to determine the champion. ALL THREE DIVISIONS WILL BE RUN WITH THE ABOVE FORMAT.

#### 5. Illegal Construction/Modifications

Based on current rules and regulations established by the All-American Soap Box Derby, in the event that any derby car is found to be constructed with illegal or unauthorized parts or if the construction includes illegal or unauthorized adjustments or modifications to parts within the derby racer, the Board of Trustees of the Wayne-Holmes Soap Box Derby reserves the right to disqualify or impose penalties upon drivers of such illegally constructed cars. This may include the forfeiture of any championship titles, trophies and prizes awarded. The Board of Trustees of the Wayne-Holmes Soap Box Derby reserves this right throughout its locally run race and during All-American race competitions in which the driver is serving as a representative of the Wayne-Holmes Soap Box Derby.

No adjustments, modifications or position changes are allowed to be made to any parts of the derby car, after inspection, with the exception of car weights or authorized repairs made under the inspection of a derby official.

#### 6. Registration Forms

All official All-American registration forms must be completed and turned into the derby director along with a copy of the driver's birth certificate, before the driver can take their first trial run. The social security number for each driver is also needed.

#### 7. Derby Racer Impound

**All derby cars must be impounded at Triway Junior High School Gymnasium on or before Saturday, June 14th, 2008 from 5:00pm to 7:00pm, with NO EXCEPTIONS.** Triway Junior High School is located off Ohio Route 226, south of Wooster, at the west end of the parking lot. After you have completed forms, voted for the queen, had your racer impounded, and had your picture taken, you must leave the gym area.

8. During inspection and weigh-in you must stay with your car while in the check out area.

9. If any repairs are required to be completed in order to qualify, they must be done by the contestant and parent, under the supervision of a derby official.

#### 10. Alignment and waxing

Contestants will be permitted to adjust alignment, spindles and wax their racers in specified areas before going through inspection. Cars must be ready for inspection by scheduled time. You must furnish your own alignment tools and extra weight, and crew, for final inspection.

#### 11. Car Numbers

The inspection and weigh-in officials will place a car number sticker on the left side of the car in an area that will be visible to the starting line judges.

#### 12. Final Weigh-in

Final Weigh-in will consist of 2 measurements. A total weight must be taken of the entire car & driver, and the proportional weight of the tail of the car with the driver positioned in a true racing posture. Both measurements must be within the limits set forth for that car's racing division. Because the driver is a vital part of these measurements, he/she should be dressed in clothing and shoes to approximate their race day attire. Final Weigh-in must occur within a 45 minute time limit from the time that your final inspection is completed or the car is subject to possible re-inspection by the official derby inspector for that race division.

*After your car leaves the final weigh-in station the night of inspection, it will be immediately impounded and no further work will be permitted on the car!*

After final weigh-in, remember to take home all your equipment, tools, wax, etc.... Remember, on race day to take your equipment, tools and extra weight to the topside area, in case you need them.

#### 13. Race Car Covers

Coverings will be permitted and are recommended for your derby car during race week. All coverings will be removed by the trustees on the night when the area is open to the public for heat drawings and open house. It is recommended that the drivers name be written onto any coverings for easier identification.

#### 14. Car Blocks

All derby cars are required to have a set of wooden blocks for the car to rest on. Wood blocks must be small enough to fit inside the cockpit of the car. Recommended construction of blocks consists of two 2x4 pieces of lumber, 12 inches long fastened together in an inverted T-shape. These blocks can be covered in foam or carpeting to protect the car. Driver names should be written on all blocks.



#### 15. Driver Apparel

Every driver must race in an official derby T-shirt, full length slacks or knee length shorts, unaltered racing helmet with the beak facing forward. Derby T-shirts will be issued to each driver following their final weigh-in. First time drivers only will receive helmets. All other drivers are expected to use the helmet that they were issued at past derby races.

#### 16. Race Wheels

All derby race families are to supply their own complete set of Z-GLAS wheels for each participating car. Wheels must be marked with an identifying name and with a small arrow indicating the proper direction of rotation. Be sure to mark them correctly. Racers will not necessarily be racing on their own set of wheels. Race wheel sets will be distributed by the Derby trustees through a systematic wheel dispersment within each racing division. Race wheels will follow a progressive format, in which wheels will progress from race to race with the last driver to use them.

If a race family cannot supply a complete set of good wheels, the local derby will supply them wheels from the existing wheel bank. All wheels will be uniformly inspected, cleaned and lubricated by the board of local derby officials before race day. Wheels or wheel sets that are judged to be unsafe or appear to be altered will be rejected and replaced with a set from the local wheel bank. All wheels must be secured with a pin clip only!

If for any reason a wheel is damaged due to an obvious or reported collision, accident or mishandling by a racing contestant. That contestants race family will be liable for compensation or equal replacement of the damaged wheel set. Requests for compensation should be handled between the effected race families and only brought to the Derby Director or Board of Trustees for clarification or mediation.

From the experience of the local derby association, race wheels should be stored in a dry area where they will not be subjected to fluctuations between hot and cold temperatures.

#### 17. Spindle Washers

All cars are limited to the use of no more than eight washers on axle spindles. The position and/or placement must remain constant throughout all phases and heats. The placement and position of spindle washers is the responsibility of the participating race driver, and should be inspected before each phase of a race heat. In the case that the washers don't fit because of varying wheel widths, adjustment may be made when accompanied with the consultation of the top-side director. Spindle washers must return to their original placement and position once tight fitting wheels are rotated off the car.

#### 18. Driver Conduct

The Wayne-Holmes Soap Box Derby is conducted as a youth racing event within the spirit of fair, equal and sportsman-like competition. The driver is responsible for and may be disciplined for personal conduct as well as the personal conduct of people in the drivers party including, but not limited to sponsors, pit crew, family members, etc....

#### 19. Race Track Helpers

In the spirit of fairness, volunteer track helpers who are parents, siblings or others connected with a participating driver are asked to avoid handling and/or contact with their related racer's car.

#### 20. Heat/Lane Drawings

A Random drawing for each racing division will be held during the derby open house event held on Thursday, prior to the race. This drawing will determine the initial heat and lane a driver will race in. All racers receiving a bye can automatically advance to the next heat and the driver is not required to run that heat, however drivers do have a choice to run a warm-up run. (See rule 21 for requirements and restrictions on warm-up runs)

#### 21. Warm-up Runs

(A) Any driver that receives a bye in the opening rounds of the winner's bracket, may by their own choice take a single run down the track at a time designated by the starting line judge, which precedes any head to head competition. Lane assignment for all warm-up runs will be the opposite lane from the contestants next head to head competition. There are no warm-up runs for bye races in the consolation bracket.

(B) The finalist of the winners bracket, may by their own choice take a single run down the track immediately following the 2nd phase of the consolation bracket finals.

(C) Any driver that decides to take a warm-up run must complete the entire length of the race track and cross the finish line to qualify for the next heat. Race judges may override this rule in consideration of wheel/equipment failure which is outside the normal control of the race contestant.

#### 22. Oil/Lubrications

NO Oil or any type of lubrication or treatment of any kind will be permitted in, on or close to the wheels. The wheels are pre-lubed and this is all the oil needed.

23. On Race Day, drivers must stay with their race car at all times unless they are instructed to do otherwise. Drivers must get permission to leave the pit area, and no parent is allowed in the pit area or runout area, unless they are a worker.

24. The driver has one minute, 30 seconds to place his/her car on the starting ramp and 30 seconds to assume their driving position. After one minute the driver can be disqualified. Master car drivers are allotted an additional 15 seconds.

25. Contestants must drive their cars carefully and obey all safety rules. If the driver or his/her car interferes with the other racer going down the hill, he/she will be disqualified from that heat by the judges. Drivers should avoid crossing over the line separating the two lanes. If a contestant drives his/her car completely over the lane separation line, including all four wheels, that driver will be deemed out of control and disqualified from that phase and the heat.

26. Rocking, Ducking or Bobbing

Drivers may not rock or lunge forward on the starting ramp. Contestants must drive their cars while constantly maintaining a driver's posture that allows them to see the track in front of them. Ducking of the drivers head inside the car or bobbing up and down will be grounds for disqualification by race officials.

27. Finish Line Timer

In the event that a derby car, its driver, or any object that moves by the influence of a derby car or its driver, hits or collides with any part of the finish line timer system, the driver will be disqualified from that race heat. Disqualification is from that race heat, which includes both phase one and phase two races.

28. Heat Time Limit

Both phase races of a heat must be completed within a 30 minute time limit. If due to weather delay or other uncontrollable circumstance both phases are not run within the 30 minute time limit, the heat will be void and both phases will be run again. If the delay is due to a racer making repairs, the second phase and heat will be forfeited by the driver unable to complete the race.

29. Race Day Repairs

Every driver should make sure that their car is in good running condition after each phase of racing. Requests for all repairs must be made to the bottom-side or top-side director. Drivers must have a pit pass in order to enter the pits for repairs.

30. Pit Repair Time Limits

If a derby car must go to the pits for repairs, a driver may have one person to assist as an advisor. The name of this person must be turned in at inspection. The pit director will have these names. We will not wait for this person to show up. A driver is limited to 20 minutes for pit repairs between each phase or heat. This time limit starts as soon as the car enters the pits. The pit crew will not furnish alignment tools or services.

31. Eliminated Car & Wheels Release

After each car is eliminated (2nd Loss), it will be retired to a side area at the bottom of the race track and will be held there under the supervision of the Derby Board of Trustees. Any car will be released to its appropriate race family immediately after elimination. Eliminated cars and wheels are expected to be taken by race families the same day as their race event. Race wheels will be removed from eliminated cars. Race wheels will be held as an official part of the race event until they are removed from an eliminated car. Race families must be sure to take only their own set of wheels.

32. Division Winners

All First and Second Place cars in each division will be impounded immediately following each championship heat. Following the awards ceremony, the 1st, and 2nd place cars in each division will be taken to a location, determined by the Derby Director and Trustees, to be photographed and inspected. The second place cars will be released only after the winning cars have been certified as champions.

33. After certification, The Derby Director and Chief Inspector will notify the champion and parents that the car is ready for shipment to Akron. This will be done at a mutually agreed upon time for all parties involved. Each champion will be allowed to make his/her car ready for shipment to Akron. The car may be waxed, aligned, weight shifted as spelled out in the official rule book. It is the responsibility of the Derby Director to supervise and be sure that any rule irregularities, race day damages and safety items are repaired prior to shipment to Akron.

34. The authorization for shipment of all champion cars to the All-American is the responsibility of the Derby Director and the release authorization from the All-American is the responsibility of the Wayne-Holmes, Derby Director.

35. Participation awards will be presented during the race. All trophy awards will be presented at the finish line after the race.
